As she is roped in to be the brand ambassador for beauty and wellness platform Boddess, the actor says the idea is to instill the values of self-love and body positivity among the masses. "We, women, need to create communities that endorse self-love and inclusivity. We shouldn't be expected to conform to social standards of beauty. My first film gave me confidence, and Sandhya [her character] made me fall in love with myself. Beauty is about finding your own happiness, which includes [attaining] mental and

physical well-being

The actor is proud that the definition of beauty has undergone a much neede overhaul globally. Close home too, the ripple effect can be felt — the countr once obsessed with a skin, is slowly leaving archaic thoughts behin Pednekar, who fough 'fair is beautiful' no head-on in Bala (2019), sa she has actively steer clear of endorsing whiten-ing creams. "I say no to fair-ness cream [ads] because I don't want young women to feel lesser because of their skin tone. When I do a Bala, I want to empower people who are told they are not good enough be-cause of their skin colour. The obsession with fairness has reduced slightly. The conversation will [result in change] only when we have enough people talking about it.
